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

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"If you want to lead, then you have to read" — a Lanterian

Last fall, I was driving in my car and listening to a talk show. The radio host was interviewing a retired United States Navy admiral, James Stavridis. Admiral Stavridis was speaking about a book he had just published called *The Leader's Bookshelf*. The purpose of his writing the book was to show how central reading is to leading. In the book, he provided a summary of the top fifty books that he recommends that demonstrate leadership that is impactful. During the interview, he said something that

really stuck with me, "If you want to lead, then you have to read."

Each of us, as Christians, lead in our own way. We may not be the leader of a company, a pastor of a church or the head of a department, but we lead nonetheless. We lead by the content of our character. We lead by how we live a virtuous life. We lead by our example. Reading is one means which gives us examples, illustrations and insights that help us to grow, develop, lead and live like Christ.

Therefore, it is not that we read, but what we read that is important. What we read helps to shape and form us, and it is a gateway to self-examination and growth as a person. Because of this reality, it is important that we read and get to know "good"

books" and then share them with others, so that they, too, may benefit from the same lessons we have learned.

Venerable Bruno Lanteri learned the power of good books to shape, form and develop a person's relationship with Christ. Through his mentor and spiritual companion, Father Nikolaus von Diessbach, SJ, he developed a passion for reading and had a gift for putting the right book in the right hands at the right time, to help individuals grow in their human and spiritual life.

Ven. Bruno's fervor influenced me in a personal and profound way several years ago. It ignited a fire that had grown dim within me. Having lost the enthusiasm for reading I had during my seminary training, I prayed for the grace to find it again. I prayed that this passion be used in my ministry of preaching, teaching and directing retreats. God answered my prayer.

The fire grew and a love for reading returned. I began to read whenever I could find time. Whether it was fifteen minutes here or thirty minutes there, I always found time to read. This new found fire enriched my preaching, my conversations with people from all walks of life, and guided me to put the right book in the right hands at the right time to help someone in his or her relationship with God.

The fruits of this grace had an effect upon the people from the parish where I celebrate Mass on Sundays. Often, they asked for the title of a book I quoted from in my homily. Later they shared how the book I recommended helped them in their lives and

provided practical examples that made a difference.

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One example was a story I shared from a book entitled, How Now Shall We Live? by Charles Colson. In one chapter, he describes the story of a soldier who was severely wounded, with little chance of survival, during a battle in the Vietnam War. When placed in the hallway of a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital (MASH) one doctor made a choice to save his life even though it was doubtful he would survive surgery. Others questioned the doctor's decision as he was thought to have little quality of life and would make no contribution to society if he survived: he had lost both legs, his left arm and one of his eyes. The soldier survived, went on to marry, have children and live a productive life. In turn, he gave hope to other wounded soldiers who returned from the battlefield. His life had dignity and so did theirs. The doctor, who was a Christian himself, did not give up on him. This helped him to see that neither did God.

Several months later, a grandmother approached me and said how the story I shared in the homily helped her twenty-eight-year-old granddaughter who was seriously depressed and on the verge of despair. The story she heard led her to believe that she had value in the eyes of God and was important to others. The story encouraged her not to give up, but to keep going. It provided her an example of what it looks like to lead a life of perseverance, hope and trust.

Good books and stories inspire and lead people to grow spiritually and humanly. They can also offer hope. I have seen that in my own life and in the lives of others. Good books help us to see ourselves in them and how God is with us through those stories.

Fr. Lanteri knew how the power of a book can create positive change in a person that lasts. The right book at the right time can help us and others to be the best version of ourselves. In this way, we lead and point others to Christ whom we follow.

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Fr. Bill Brown's Top Ten Summer Reading List

We asked Fr. Bill what top ten books he would recommend for a summer reading list, and these were his suggestions. Enjoy!

#1 How Now Shall We Live? by Charles Colson and Nancy Pearcey

Compares and contrasts Christian worldview from a secular world view and why the former is the one that makes sense and provides meaning. Through the categories of creation, fall, redemption and restoration, he provides inspiring and moving stories that show what this looks like in the lives of real people who are committed to Christ.

#2 Jesus, A Pilgrimage, by James Martin, SJ

Using the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius as a framework, and his personal pilgrimage to the Holy Land, this book provides riveting meditation on Jesus that helps the person encounter him in a deeply personal way.

#3 Boys in the Boat, by Daniel James Brown

Story of nine Americans and their quest for the gold medal at the 1936 Olympics. An inspiring story of teamwork, discipline, grit and perseverance and how we need each other to go farther than we could go by ourselves. Great lesson for us as Christians as members of the Body of Christ.

#4 Being The Body, by Charles Colson and Ellen Santilli Vaughn

Living in a world and culture that criticizes the Church and the truth of Gospel, this book challenges Christians to a new sense of unity and to stand up and not withdraw to the comfort of our sanctuaries, but give witness to Christ in the public square.

#5 Resisting Happiness, by Matthew Kelly

Founder of Dynamic Catholic, Matthew Kelly gives the reasons why we sabotage ourselves, set aside our dreams and lack the courage to simply be ourselves. He provides thirty-seven practical lessons of how to start choosing happiness again and to be the person God has made you to be.

#6 A Chance in the World: An orphan boy, a mysterious past and how he found a place called home, by Steve Pemberton

This is an autobiographical memoir. When a toddler and abandoned by his parents, a babysitter jotted down the words, "This little boy doesn't have a chance in the world." A stirring account of courage, hope and victory, this book is a story about what is possible when you dare to believe.

#7 **To Light A Fire on the Earth**, by Bishop Robert Baron with John L. Allen, Jr.

Drawn from conversations with journalist John L. Allen, this book proclaims the beauty of the Catholic tradition and Bishop Baron offers smart, practical, artistic and theological observations to how we might proclaim the Gospel in a secular age.

#8 **Seven Women: and the Secret of Their Greatness**, by Eric Metaxas

In this book, Metaxas provides an answer to the question, What makes a great woman great? Whether it is Mother Teresa, Corrie Ten Boom or Joan of Arc, Metaxas tells the captivating stories of seven women who changed the course of history and impacted the world in astonishing ways.

#9 The Freedom of Self-Forgetfulness by Timothy Keller

In this short, but yet profound book, Timothy Keller "shows that gospel humility means we can stop connecting every experience, every conversation with ourselves and can be thus free from self-condemnation." The book describes gospel-humble person is not a self-hating or a self-loving person, but a self-forgetful person.

#10 Tattoos on the Heart, by Gregory Boyle, SJ

An astonishing book about suffering, dignity, death and resurrection. Gregory Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries, has been working for two decades with gang members in the Los Angeles County. This book is a true story of what love, affirmation and a second chance can do to bring about

Oración por la intercesión del Venerable Bruno Lanteri


Oh Padre, fuente de toda la vida y santidad,
