Spiritual Thought



John the Baptist wore camel hair. Why? It protected him from the scorching desert sun and the Sirocco winds that sand blasted his body. He wore a leather belt. Why? Because his camel coat was oversized. Why was it oversized? So he could use it at night as a blanket or a tent. It was his house. He ate locust and wild honey because he lived in the desert. Put all that together and you have a


man who is completely independent. He has no needs. I in contrast to John have needs. I need to take up a collection at Mass every Sunday because I have to pay the bills. I live in a church that is almost one hundred years old. Every day I wake up and wonder what is going to break. I have lots of needs while John has none.

Let's say I went to John the Baptist and said, "Thank you for my baptism and forgiving my sins. I have a fresh start in life. I have a renewed relationship with God. I am so grateful to you...here is five dollars." John is not going to need my money. There is no Mini-Mart in the desert. Money is useless to him. And that is why everyone goes out to the desert to see John the Baptism. He is real. Someone who is real makes sacrifice because he loves and believes in something. Whatever he does, whatever sacrifices he has to make, it is because he loves God and the people who he serves.

A young man living in Nigeria applied to the United States government for a green card and he got it. Do you know how hard it is to be a Nigerian and get a green card from the United States government? It is easier for you or me to walk across the street to the store, buy a scratch ticket and win ten million dollars. Amazingly, he got the ticket to the good life. He left his family and homeland came here to college. After hard work and applying himself to his studies, he graduated and landed a great job. He worked his way up the corporate ladder and received a nice salary. He used the money resourcefully for food and rent thinking that every nickel that he didn't spend on himself, he could send to his mom and dad. This is a great story of self-sacrifice and generosity. But it doesn't end there. So, there he is standing on top of the mountain of success and guess what he does? He gives me a phone call. Why? I was the vocation director for the Oblates of the Virgin Mary and he wants to join the seminary. On the phone he told me his story and then I replied, "Let me get this straight. You left your family and friends to come to a foreign land and work hard on your education. You landed a great joy. You worked your way up the ladder and now you want to give it all up? Are you crazy?" Actually I didn't say that. What I said was, "impressive." You are exactly the person we need to help us with our work. I am very happy to tell you that he is now a priest working in the Philippines.

I have one more story about him. He asked me to preach at his first mass. So I flew to a parish in the mid-west where he was working as a deacon for a year. At the end of mass, the newly ordained priest got up to say a few words. He began his talk with a "funny story." Then he laughed hysterically at his own joke. He brought the house down. Then he told them something heartwarming and everyone pulled out handkerchiefs and mopped up their checks from the water works. When he was finished the church filled with all white folks stood up before the African born priest and applauded...and they never stopped. Why? It was not because of his bad joke; it was the same reason everyone went out to the desert to be baptized by John. The man was real.

The gospel is calling us to be real, that is, someone who genuinely loves others and God for all the right reasons.
