Spiritual Thought

Jesus was walking by a village and saw a widow who was about to bury her only son. Scripture said that Jesus had pity on her. I do not mean to be critical of the English translation, but we do not have a word to translate the Greek for "pity." The word is $\sigma\pi\lambda\alpha\gamma\chi\gamma\dot{}\zeta\omega$ or splagchnizo. It is an explosive word and

takes some practice even to say it. *Splagchnizo* means that the innards, the guts—that is, your heart, liver, kidneys—start to wiggle, or shake. All these inside organs sort of wake-up and it is as if the inside organs are saying to the outside parts, like the hands and feet: "Well, do something." Jesus did. But before He did this, He said, to the mom. "Do not cry." Why? Jesus said, "Blessed are those who cry, they will laugh." That's what God does: He turns mourning into joy. He went over to the dead body and raised the son to life. My question is: How do you get your innards to wiggle, or shake? How do you get the inside to say to the outside, "Well do something?"

Here is another example. The prodigal son took his inheritance and squandered it. He was starving and decided to go back to his father. You know the plot. When he returned, the father saw him at a distance. Why does it say, "He saw him at a distance?" This is not the first time he looks down the road to see if his son is on his way home. When he saw the son, he had a case of *splagchnizo*. His innards started to move, his whole body was energized, telling his arms and legs to do something. So he did. He ran, he threw his arms around the son, clothed him, and threw him a party. It is a terrific story. Again, my question is: "How do you get your insides to wiggle, wake up and tell the outside body parts: 'Do something'"? Not everyone has *splagchnizo*. The elder son, the brother, did not have it, he is faithful and hard working. Why doesn't he have *splagchnizo*?

Here is one more example. The man who fell to robbers was stripped, beaten and left naked to die. A priest and a Levite walk by the man and passed by him. When a Samaritan walked by, he took pity on the man, and *splagchnizo*. His guts moved and told his body to do something. He took oil and wine, dressed the wounds, clothed him and cared for him. It is a terrific story. So how do you get your insides to *splagchnizo* because not everyone has it? Holy people like the priest and the Levite who pray and are close to God do not. We have it because we want to be like Christ, the father, and the Samaritan. Jeremiah tells us that God is about to do something great for everyone. What could it be? This gift will allow us to do great things. God said to the prophet, "I will place My law within them and write it upon their hearts." What law? The law of Love. Remember when God said, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart with all your soul, with all your mind? The heart is inside; the mind is inside, the soul is inside. You cannot get *splagchnizo* when you are driving and the light turns red. You cannot get *splagchnizo* when you are on your way to jury duty. You do not get *splagchnizo* filling out your tax form.

As you know, I have a close relationship with my dad. In fact, I call him every night. After Mass last week, I took out my flip phone, to see if I got a call because that is about all a flip phone can do. Flip phones cannot give you directions to Pasadena, California, or tickets to the ball game and they do not tell you what is going on in Washington. I had a message: "This is Dr. So-and-so and you father needs heart surgery." When I heard this I thought, "How can this be? He was working on a roof two days ago; I just called him last night." The voice said, "Can you give me a call?" You bet your *splagchnizo*. I called him. He said "Are you Fr. Peter from St. Clement?" I said "Yes." I used to attend your church while I was an intern. I remember the fishing stories of your father." He was all excited that he made the connection between us. And he asked how I was doing. I said, "I hate to change the subject, but why does Dad need surgery?"

Here is the faith lesson. God gave us a gift. He placed the law of love inside of us so our innards would move and tell our legs and arms to do something great. Not everyone has *splagchnizo*, but if we are going to be Christians, we absolutely need it.
