The Class will be Tuesdays, 7-8 PM in the Upper Room on these dates:



Spiritual Thought from Fr. Peter Grover, OMV



One of the doors at the church was hinge-bound. So I went to my tool box and found my chisel. Apparently someone borrowed the wood chisel and used it as a crowbar. It was so dull that I couldn't cut through pudding. No, I did not throw it out and buy a new one. I called Dad. Why did I call Dad? He has chisels that he bought in the sixties, and still uses them every day. He said, "Bring it over, and I'll show you how to sharpen it." We went to the grinding wheel, and he said, "I will tell a secret that few know. Run the chisel over the wheel one time, then dip it in water. You do not want the tip to get too hot because it will weaken. After several passes and several

dips in the water, the chisel was sharp as a razor. As long as I have that chisel, I will never throw it out and buy a new one.

I tell you that because God has a toolbox. He reaches in to grab his chisel -- which is you. You are his instrument. Over time and with hard use, you will get dull. That is what happened. That is what happened to Judas.

Jesus sent Judas out with the other apostles, and like the other apostles, Judas cured the sick, expelled demons, and preached the gospel. When he returned to Jesus he was tired, and Jesus said, "Let us go to a deserted place to rest." When they got there, five thousand families showed up, and Judas had to serve them all food. Just after that, Jesus tells Judas to get in a boat and cross to the other side. Naturally, there is a storm, and he has to row against the wind until the fourth watch of the night, presumably four or five in the morning. After a long period and hard use, Judas said, "I am tired, I am dull, I am not sharp as I used to be, I am useless and no good." So he decided to part ways and wanted a little compensation for the three years of service. He thought Jesus would be fine. The high priests are never going to outsmart Jesus; they are no match for the Lord.

What happened to Judas could happen to anyone of us. Over the passage of time and hard use, we get dull. I have heard it hundreds of times. People tell me that they feel as if they do not have any faith anymore. But we are never useless.

It happened to me. When my mother was very sick, I was on-call for the Longwood Hospitals every weekend. I was director of St. Clement and running out to the nursing home often. I got tired. My mother died on the evening of the first Friday of May. The first Friday of every month was a special time for me and my mother. Once a month we would go to a church and do a holy hour together. That is what we did for years. She died at the hour we would be praying together in a church. It was a sign for me. God said, "Peter, I know you are tired. But know that I am watching out for you." I said to God, "Thank you." He sharped my blade. He injected new life into me.

It happens. We get dull and we feel that our faith is no longer effective or productive, like a dull chisel in the tool box. But never think that God discards and replaces us. That is not what the professionals do. That is not what my father does. That is not what God does. That is why God seeks after the lost sheep, why Jesus eats with sinners and tax collectors. We are valuable to God. We are his instruments. Do not do what Judas did. Stay in God's tool box no matter how dull your faith may feel.
