

When the veteran quarterback Drew Bledsoe was injured, a young rookie, Tom Brady, was pulled to be the throwing arm for the Patriots. He did a good job and got the team to the playoffs. When the playoffs arrived there was a question: Should they go with the now healed veteran or with the younger, less experienced Tom Brady? It was my opinion at the time that they should go with the old guy, the veteran arm. I also remember there were

many others who agreed with me. I was wrong. Tom Brady took the team through the playoffs and won the Super Bowl.

One summer I decided to paint my room. I thought green would be a nice color. I picked two shades. In my opinion, the colors matched and the room was going to be beautiful. When the room was finished, I opened the door, turned the light on and felt like I was inside a bowl of pea soup. I was wrong again. My opinion is about fifty percent. On a very good day I may hit sixty.

Let me ask you a question: When you come to Mass at St. Clement Eucharistic Shrine, do you want to hear my opinion? (Answer, NO, now.) But what if my opinion is good and almost everyone agrees with me, do you still want to hear it? (Answer, NO, now.) That's right because my opinion has a fifty percent margin of error. When you come to Mass, you want to hear the Word of our Lord.

Peter said, "Lord, remember when you were preaching to the five thousand men and their families and when you finished you told us to feed them? We only had two loaves of bread. I did the math. You can't feed five thousand families with two loaves of bread. We didn't have enough money to feed them, so it was my opinion at the time that we could not do it. Then you said the blessing and you were right. Another time, parents led us to their sick daughter. We went into her room and I know that the twelve-year-old had died. She was white as a sheet. You didn't think she was dead because you told us, 'She is just asleep.' When you said to the dead girl, 'Get up' I panicked. It was my opinion that what you said was upsetting to the parents. You were right again. Once you said to put out for the deep and cast the nets for a catch. I am an experienced fisherman, and it was my opinion that we were wasting our time based on fishing all night and catching nothing. But I listened to you, and again you were right. Today you tell us to eat Your Body and drink Your Blood. I have no idea what you are talking about. Then you ask if we are going to leave you. I will never leave you. I am staying with you. I only know one thing: when you speak you are right. You have the words of everlasting life." This is faith.

In the Gospel we see Jesus asleep on a cushion at the bottom of the boat. A disciple, an experienced fisherman, wakes Jesus up because he thinks they are all going to die. You would think fishermen were experienced sailors on rough waters. A disappointed Jesus got up and calmed the storm. I find that amazing. They just saw Jesus cure an entire village of sick people; they just saw a paralyzed man walk. You would think with all that "seeing" they would know that the Divine is with them. You would think they had faith, but the storm revealed who has faith and who didn't. As He admonished doubting Thomas — blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe. And that's us!
