Several years ago when I was stationed in New Jersey, I was asked to give a talk during Lent. I was happy to accept the invitation. When I got up to deliver my talk, the church was standing room only. There was energy, a buzz in the church that I felt inside me. It was inspirational. They laughed, cried and felt good all over. I thought that it was the best talk I had ever given. I would love to give that talk again remember what I said; I never wrote it down. A similar thing happened when I applied for Licentiate at

Boston College. As a requirement on the application, I was asked to submit a paper as a sample of writing skills. I knew exactly the paper I wanted to give them: an unpublished paper on the Dead Sea scrolls. I went to my file cabinet and pulled out my file on "Bible Stuff," and it was not there. I can guess what happened to it. I have a personality disorder which craves for clean and neat. Clutter and chaos I detest, so "When in doubt, I throw it out." Now I can't remember the best talk I ever gave and I can't remember the best paper I ever wrote. So what do I remember?

Over twenty years ago, I went on a vacation in the deep woods of Maine. We arrived late so I went to bed. I heard a bullfrog outside. "No problem," I thought. I can handle a bullfrog. The reason I can put up with the sounds of a bullfrog is simple. I live at 1105 Boylston Street. At 11:20 pm during the summer, the ball game gets out and there is a traffic jam in front of my bedroom window. At 2:00am the bars close and all the happy people walk under my window at around 2:16am. At 4:00am one of the students at the music school across the street can't sleep so he decides that there is nothing better to do than to play the bongo drums. I can handle a bullfrog. The frog sounded off in threes. "Rabbet, rabbet, rabbet." About a minute later it makes three more sounds: "rabbet, rabbet, rabbet, rabbet." About a wind off again this time: "rabbet, rabbet, rabbet, rabbet." That was only two. What happened to the third? Augh. The next morning I said to my Dad, "That bull frog is driving me crazy." Dad said, "I know what to do. He got a red cloth, rolled it into a ball, the size of a marble, and tied it to a string. He went outside and he dangled the red cloth, bobbing up and down through the tall grass. Sure enough, a large bullfrog charged at the cloth. The frog grabbed it with its mouth and didn't let go. Dangling in midair, my father said, "Grab it, grab it." So I grabbed it and we ran to the powerboat and he rode to the other side of the lake. When he pulled up to some tall grass he said: "Toss it." I let it hop out of my hand. That night I slept beautifully.

That was over twenty years ago and do you know that I remember every detail of that day. What does this tell me? It tells me that the most important things in my life are not about my achievements or accomplishments. My finest moments are when I am a son.

Jesus is transfigured on top of a mountain where no one can see Him. But what if He were transfigured in front of the large crowds that gathered to hear Him? Think of what that would have done to His career. Jesus would have rock star status. Or imagine His trial before Pilate. All His enemies, all the doubters, and the naysayers–all gathered together in one place–were to see Him transfigured. They would have made Him emperor. Think of what that would have done to Jesus' professional life? Or if Jesus appeared to us in His glory for just a moment with myriads of adoring angels - we would never doubt again. But it never happened. He was transfigured and glorified before His Father. What does that tell you? It is not about the career. It is not about the accomplishments or the achievements. It is about His relationship with His Father. It is about their partnership. We need to remember that the most important thing in life is not about careers, how much money we make, the titles we hold, the books we write or the positions we hold. The most important thing in our lives is our relationships. We are sons and daughters of God. Everything else takes a distant second.
