Through the RCIA program, the Catholic Church extends an invitation to:


- Those who are not associated with a community of faith and who wish to become Catholics;

Spiritual Thought

My uncle was in Hawaii and visited the leper colony of St. Fr. Damien on the island of Molokai. The only way to the village was by donkey. When my uncle got on the donkey, he said, "This isn't so bad." But once the donkey stepped out on the ledge it was a different story. On one side was a wall of stone, on the other a thousand foot drop. When he saw the drop he said, "I don't think this looks like a very good idea." But, it was too late to turn around. The path was too narrow and is a one-way street. He turned to the guide behind him and asked about the conditions, hoping to hear some words of encouragement or reassurance. All the guide said was "Good Luck!" He made it to the colony, alive.

Sin is like getting on the donkey. It is not so bad at first, but when it steps out onto the ledge, it seems that your life is going in one direction without the option of turning around. I say this because Christ makes it clear that this will never happen to us. If our life is headed for the wrong direction, there is always a jug handle or a fork in the road with a sign: Turn Around Here.

In the ancient world, there were targets with a bulls-eye for archery. The target is a measure to determine the accuracy of a shot. Let's say you hiccup as you are about to shoot. The arrow will probably not be on a path to the bulls-eye. There is a Hebrew word for this: *Hatta*, which means, missing the mark. That is the word for sin. Now that we know the meaning of sin, we can take a look at Peter.

Peter had just got in from fishing all night, when our Lord jumped in his boat to preach to the crowds on the shoreline. Peter waited until he was finished so he could clean up and go home. After the discourse, Jesus says to Peter, "Let's catch some fish." I guess Jesus is not familiar with the good fishing strategy. If it is a warm sunny day, the fish are not going to be near the surface. Peter explains to Him that to fish you need the right time and condition, but, "If you say so, I will lower the nets." Well, we know what happed. The fish they caught almost sank two boats. Peter was impressed. The curing of his mother-in-law a few days earlier didn't muster up the same excitement. After seeing the fish, Peter knelt before our Lord and told Him to depart "for I am a sinful man." We now know what Peter meant when he said sinful. It means that Peter is on a path in life that is not going in the right direction. What does Jesus tell him? "Follow me and I will get you to the bulls-eye."

Everyone knows what confession is: We go and tell our sins. We get absolution from the priest and we feel nice and clean again for about five minutes until we mess up again. Then back we go to get rid of more sins. Well that is not confession. Confession is really a check-in with God to make sure we have the most important things in life: humility, honesty, and most of all, God. We think we are telling God our sins but what God hears is not what we say, but what is between the lines. It takes a humble, honest person who needs God to go to confession. When you go to confession, you just checked-in to tell Him your spiritual life going in the right direction. Sin always means that we need God. That is not a bad place to be with God. It means we need to follow our Lord and He will get us the bulls-eye.
