Reflection

In a recent homily, Fr. Paul addressed Jesus's remark to his home that 'no prophet is accepted in his native place.' His childhood neighbors are incensed, and try to throw him off a hill.

They want miracles, and all he gives them is His presence. And the pronouncement that he has fulfilled the reading from Isaiah:

'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor.'

All He gives them is His presence.

As Catholic Christians, we are Jesus's hometown buddies. Many of us grew up with the Sacraments, with the Eucharist (and if we didn't, how long does it take for familiarity to wipe the slate clean of wonder?).

But in Adoration, Jesus is fully and wholly present. Today He is with us.

Fr. Paul wondered if we all dismiss Jesus because He isn't doing mighty deeds today (seemingly). I wondered if I'm ever prone to throwing Jesus off a cliff – figuratively speaking – in my heart.

What if you could have been there when Jesus spoke in the synagogue that day (Luke 4:16-30)?

I want miracles, and all He gives me is His presence.

Why didn't his neighbors see that miracle? If I don't stop into see Jesus, am I forgetting the incredible miracle that today He's here, fulfilling all the promises since the beginning of time from a God who loves me?

FROM THE SAINTS: St. Michael the Archangel



St. Michael the Archangel is "one of the chief princes" (Dan. 10:13). He is the Chief Commander of the Army of God, and remains at the forefront of the spiritual battle against Satan. By the authority of Christ, he and his army of angels cast Satan out of Heaven at the beginning of time, and will play a similar role at the end of salvation history (Rev. 12:7).
