

Teenage Saint

Nunzio Sulprizio was born on April 13, 1817, in Pescara, Italy. His father died when Nunzio was only three years old. Nunzio's mother remarried, but his stepfather paid no attention to him. Still, Nunzio faithfully attended Mass, prayed, and studied the lives of the saints. Their stories helped him learn how to live a holy, faith-filled life.

When his mother died, Nunzio was sent to live with his grandmother. She encouraged Nunzio to remain strong in his faith. But she, too, soon died, and Nunzio was sent to live with and to work for his Uncle Domenico. His uncle was a cruel man who did not see to Nunzio's physical comfort or

health and who overworked him. Domenico would beat or curse Nunzio if his work was unsatisfactory. Eventually Nunzio became very ill. He offered his pain and suffering to God. In time, another uncle introduced him to a fellow soldier who provided for Nunzio's care and for his needs. Nunzio made some progress, but the pain persisted, and he eventually died from his injuries. He was nineteen years old.

On his path to sainthood, Saint Nunzio Sulprizio was known for his gentleness, holiness, and patience. On October 14, 2018—during the Synod of Bishops on Youth—Pope Francis named him a saint of the Church.

The Synod is an assembly of bishops from around the world who assist the Holy Father by providing counsel on important questions facing the Church in a manner that preserves the Church's teaching and strengthens her internal discipline.

DO NOT BE AFRAID

A Reflection by Fr. Isaac Abu, OMV

Forty years ago, in St. Peter's Square, Vatican City, in a Solemn liturgy, Pope John Paul II in a courageous and forceful manner told Us: "Do not be afraid. Open wide the doors for Christ. To his saving power open the boundaries of States, economic and political systems, the vast fields of culture, civilization and development. Do not be afraid. Christ knows "what is in man". He alone knows it." These precious words of encouragement are still very valid and apt for our world today that is confronted with various challenges and problems.

The society is facing problems in different spheres of life: economic, health, security, social, religious, environmental, and so on.

Consequently, many people are afraid of what the future holds. The fear is especially magnified in the lives of the younger ones that some of them are scared of making lifelong commitments.

There is need for courage in order to confront the challenges facing the world. There is no difficulty in the world that cannot be handled. We must rise to the occasion by first and foremost opening wide the doors of our hearts to Christ. He is already there knocking with expectation, hoping to come in and change our situation. "Anything is possible for anyone who has faith. Let us not be scared of what the future holds but believe in Him who holds the future." (Rev. 3:20)

One pastor once defined FEAR as "False Expectations Against Reality." Fear makes the reality confronting us to be exaggerated. According to William Jordan, the worst liars in the world are your fears; worry is the traitor in our camp that dampens our power and weakens our aim.

The audacious words our contemporary Saint, John Paul II "Do not be afraid" happen to be the words that occur frequently in the scriptures. It is occurred as much as 366 times. And a biblical scholar reflecting on this, opined that "God wants us to not be afraid every day of our lives, including the leap years."

God has provided us with various means of survival. One of these is the rosary. This month of October is dedicated to the recitation of the rosary, popularly known as *October Devotion, began by Pope Leo XIII in the in the 16th Century. There is urgent need to continue this practice of piety in our Churches and homes.*

The Rosary is a powerful weapon to fight our many battles and obtain wonderful graces. Attesting to the Rosary's efficacy, Padre Pio called it: "a weapon for these times." Pope Pius XI said: "The Rosary is a powerful weapon to put the demons to flight and to keep oneself from sin...if you desire peace in your hearts, in your homes, and in your country, assemble each evening to recite the Rosary. Let not even one day pass without saying it, no matter how burdened you may be with many cares and labors." Our Blessed Mother Mary constantly repeated to the three little of Fatima "pray the rosary." It is important to remind ourselves of what St. John Paul II (then Cardinal Karol Wojtyla) said in his visit to Philadelphia during the Eucharistic Congress in 1976:

"We are now standing in the face of the greatest historical confrontation humanity has ever experienced. I do not think that the wide circle of the American Society, or the whole wide circle of the Christian Community realize this fully. We are now facing the final confrontation between the Church and the anti-church, between the gospel and the anti-gospel, between Christ and the antichrist. The confrontation lies within the plans of Divine Providence. It is, therefore, in God's Plan, and it must be a trial which the Church must take up, and face courageously."

Let us pray in season and out of season. A Prayerful Christian is a powerful Christian. The more we practice the presence of God in our daily activities the more we are able to deal with our problems and fears. God bless you.



Oblates of the Virgin Mary—USA

The Founder of the Oblates of the Virgin Mary.

Declared "Venerable" the first step to Sainthood. The Oblates of the Virgin Mary is an international religious community of priests and brothers serving in Italy, France, Austria, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Nigeria, the United States and the Philippines. The Oblates are involved in retreat and parish missions, spiritual direction, parish work, the mass media, clergy formation, and the foreign missions.

The US Province of the Oblates of the Virgin Mary is dedicated to St. Ignatius of Loyola, and includes communities in Massachusetts, Illinois, Colorado, California and the Philippines.

The OMV US Province House is at St. Clement's in Boston.
