

## Reflection by Fr. John Wykes, OMV

It was a hot and humid Roman August in 1978 when His Holiness, Pope Paul VI, prepared his remarks for the Feast of the Transfiguration. That year the feast (August 6) would fall on a Sunday. And so it was that he wrote a reflection to be delivered at the ordinary Sunday Angelus Message. Among other things, Pope Paul noted that the Transfiguration not only tells us something about Jesus and his Divine Nature, it also tells us something about our own destiny.

"Because it has been redeemed by his irrevocable sacrifice of life," Paul wrote in his remarks, "our human nature is also destined to participate in the fullness of life, in the 'destiny of the saints in light' (Col. 1, 12). That body, which is transfigured before the astonished eyes of the apostles, is the body of Christ our brother, but it is also our body called to glory."

And so this marvelous event, ostensibly a glimpse of glory giving Peter, James, and John a little bit of hope so they could successfully weather the horrors of the Passion and Death of Our Lord, is also a window through which these disciples could glimpse their own destiny.

Yes, we are dust, and unto dust we shall return. But the story doesn't end there. Just as Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ suffered death, was buried, and rose again on the third day, so, too, we are destined not only to die but also to rise again to a new life.

Ironically, no one ever heard Pope Paul's Angelus Message with its promise of hope and new life. You see, the 80-year-old pontiff had a heart attack that very day. A blood clot in his lung took his life that evening – the Feast of the Transfiguration, August 6, 1978. It was the one and only Angelus Message the pope missed during his 15-year-long pontificate.

The words of Pope Paul, though never spoken by him, are nevertheless preserved for our appreciation and edification. His completed remarks, finished in written form but never delivered, serve as a dramatic last testament of a holy man - the final words of a pontiff who, several hours later, would cross, as Benedict XVI once called it, the "dark door of death".

Let the dving words of St. Paul VI be our inspiration this Sunday as we reflect upon the marvelous Transfiguration of Our Lord. "That body," St. Paul VI reminds us, "which is transfigured before the astonished eyes of the apostles, is the body of Christ our brother, but it is also our body called to glory. That light that floods it is, and also will be, our share of inheritance and splendor... An end of incomparable joy awaits us, if we have done 6 honor to our Christian vocation."
