



Reflection by Fr. Jeremy Paulin, OMV

My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

“This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man.” Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother and cleaves to his wife, and they become one flesh.” “Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God.” God established man and woman to cleave to one another from the beginning, and the fruit of that cleaving is children.

October is dedicated to the Rosary and it is also Respect Life Month. What better could we do than pray the Rosary for a greater respect and love for our unborn, elderly and infirm brothers and sisters wherever they may be? How about praying the daily Rosary as a family for the entire month - and beyond? Asking a greater devotion to Jesus through Mary, greater love and respect for human life from natural conception until natural death, and for an end to the instrumentalization of God's gift of love and human life that takes place in contraception, abortion, IVF, euthanasia and assisted suicide.

A beautiful offering to make to the Lord would be to read St John Paul's 2002 Letter on the Rosary, Rosarium Virginis Mariae. In that exhortation, St John Paul gave the Church the Luminous Mysteries and described how we should pray the Rosary, by contemplating the mysteries of Christ's life with Mary. By our regular praying and contemplation of the joyful, luminous, sorrowful and glorious mysteries of the life of Jesus, we appropriate them and assimilate them unto ourselves and our hearts are transformed. There are many other books on the Rosary and prayer available in our gift shop and elsewhere.

We can also take action in support of life and the most vulnerable among us - the unborn, the homeless, sick and the elderly. (Please read about Human Dignity elsewhere in this bulletin) Consider assistance to services and homes for expecting mothers which with tax dollars are under attack especially here in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The evil one strikes at human life so as to strike at God, whom he hates. Consider support for Rachel's Vineyard, a post-abortion healing ministry which brings peace and healing to broken hearts. Our Lady of the Rosary and our Lady of Gaudalupe, Patroness of the unborn, pray for us!

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

“Esto, al fin, es hueso de mis huesos y carne de mi carne; se llamará Mujer, porque fue tomada del Hombre”. Octubre está dedicado al Rosario y también es el Mes del Respeto a la Vida. ¿Qué mejor podríamos hacer que rezar el Rosario por un mayor respeto y amor por nuestros hermanos y hermanas no nacidos, ancianos y enfermos, dondequiera que estén? ¿Qué tal rezar el Rosario diario en familia durante todo el mes, y más allá? Pidiendo una mayor devoción a Jesús a través de María, un mayor amor y respeto por la vida humana desde la concepción natural hasta la muerte natural, y por el fin de la instrumentalización del don de Dios del amor y la vida humana que tiene lugar en la anticoncepción, el aborto, la fecundación in vitro, la eutanasia y el suicidio asistido.

Una hermosa ofrenda para hacer al Señor sería leer la carta de San Juan Pablo II de 2002 sobre el rosario, Rosarium Virginis Mariae. En esa exhortación, san Juan Pablo II dio a la Iglesia los misterios luminosos y describió cómo debemos rezar el rosario, contemplando los misterios de la vida de Cristo con María. A través de nuestra oración y contemplación regulares de los misterios gozosos, luminosos, dolorosos y gloriosos de la vida de Jesús, nos apropiamos de ellos y los asimilamos a nosotros mismos y nuestros corazones se transforman. Hay muchos otros libros sobre el Rosario y la oración disponibles en nuestra tienda de regalos y en otros lugares.

También podemos tomar medidas en apoyo de la vida y de los más vulnerables entre nosotros: los no nacidos, las personas sin hogar, los enfermos y los ancianos. (Por favor, lea sobre la Dignidad Humana en otra parte de este boletín) Considere la asistencia a los servicios y hogares para las mujeres embarazadas, que con el dinero de los impuestos están bajo ataque, especialmente aquí en la Mancomunidad de Massachusetts. El maligno golpea la vida humana para golpear a Dios, a quien odia. Considere el apoyo a Rachel's Vineyard, un ministerio de sanación post-aborto que trae paz y sanación a los corazones rotos. Nuestra Señora del Rosario y Nuestra Señora de Gaudalupe, Patrona de los no nacidos, ¡ruegan por nosotros!

Dignity of the Human Person

In their statement on *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on the **Dignity of the Human Person**, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series. ——★

Because each human person is created in the image and likeness of God, each one of us possesses innate and inviolable human dignity. This dignity is present in each person from the moment of their conception and throughout their lives. As Pope Francis has emphasized, human dignity is central to building a society in which we are “brothers and sisters all.”¹

Every human being has the right to live with dignity and to develop integrally; this fundamental right cannot be denied by any country. People have this right even if they are unproductive, or were born with or developed limitations. This does not detract from their great dignity as human persons, a dignity based not on circumstances but on the intrinsic worth of their being. Unless this basic principle is upheld, there will be no future either for fraternity or for the survival of humanity.²

The dignity of the human person is the foundation for a moral vision of society. As we seek to imitate the Good Samaritan and become neighbor to all, we must work to protect the dignity of all, especially those who are most vulnerable.

As we engage in the public square with a well-formed conscience:

- We work to protect the most vulnerable—children in the womb who are in danger of abortion—while also standing in radical solidarity with mothers.³ Building on their bond of flesh and kinship, and on the network of family, neighbor, and community relationships in which they are situated, the Church actively assists mothers and their children to have a brighter future.

- We continue to protect the dignity of our sister or brother who is elderly, disabled, or ill by strongly rejecting euthanasia and assisted suicide. These practices are symptoms of a “throw-away culture,” in which children of God of inestimable worth are cast aside as worthless.⁴
- Likewise, we must recognize the inherent dignity of the migrant and refugee. In our country now, that means comprehensive immigration reform that offers a path to citizenship, treats immigrant workers fairly, prevents the separation of families, maintains the integrity of our borders, respects the rule of law, and addresses the factors that compel people to leave their own countries.
- We support the dignity of the person, created male or female; therefore, we oppose a gender ideology that fails to recognize the difference and reciprocity between man and woman.⁵
- Racism attacks the dignity of the human person by denying that we are all equally made in the image of God, so we must overcome racism in our hearts as well as in our systems and institutions.⁶
- We continue to seek reform of the criminal justice system and to end the use of the death penalty. We support common sense measures to reduce gun violence.⁷
- Finally, we seek to prevent and remedy any aspects of an “economy of exclusion,”⁸ which “does not hesitate to exploit, discard, and even kill human beings,”⁹ and to work instead toward an “economy of communion” rooted in ethical concern.¹⁰

“Social friendship and universal fraternity” Pope Francis writes, “necessarily call for an acknowledgement of the worth of every human person, always and everywhere.”¹¹ Through our political participation, our accompaniment of those in need, and the witness of our daily lives, may we support the worth of every person, created in God’s image.

La dignidad de la persona humana

En su declaración *Formando la conciencia para ser ciudadanos fieles*, los obispos católicos de los Estados Unidos identifican los cuatro principios fundamentales de la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia y los aplican a algunas cuestiones concretas. No se trata de decirles a los fieles por quién o contra quién votar, sino de ayudarlos a formar sus conciencias de acuerdo con la verdad de Dios a medida que se acercan a esta decisión a menudo desafiante. Los cuatro principios fundamentales son la Dignidad de la persona humana, el Bien común, la Solidaridad y la Subsidiariedad. Todos están interrelacionados. Este boletín se enfoca en la **Dignidad de la persona humana**, y los otros tres principios se tratan en otros tres boletines de esta serie. —★

Debido a que cada persona humana es creada a imagen y semejanza de Dios, cada uno de nosotros posee una dignidad humana innata e inviolable. Esta dignidad está presente en cada persona desde el momento de su concepción y durante toda su vida. Como ha enfatizado el Papa Francisco, la dignidad humana es fundamental para construir una sociedad en la que seamos “todos hermanos”¹:

Todo ser humano tiene derecho a vivir con dignidad y a desarrollarse integralmente, y ese derecho básico no puede ser negado por ningún país. Lo tiene aunque sea poco eficiente, aunque haya nacido o

crecido con limitaciones. Porque eso no menoscaba su inmensa dignidad como persona humana, que no se fundamenta en las circunstancias sino en el valor de su ser. Cuando este principio elemental no queda a salvo, no hay futuro ni para la fraternidad ni para la sobrevivencia de la humanidad.²

La dignidad de la persona humana es el fundamento de una visión moral de la sociedad. Mientras buscamos imitar al Buen Samaritano y convertirnos en prójimos de todos, debemos trabajar para proteger la dignidad de todos, especialmente de aquellos que son más vulnerables.

Mientras participamos en el ámbito público con una conciencia bien formada:

- Trabajamos para proteger a los más vulnerables (los niños en el útero que corren peligro de sufrir un aborto) y al mismo tiempo mantenemos una solidaridad radical con las madres.³

Construyendo sobre su lazo de sangre y parentesco, y sobre la red de relaciones familiares, vecinales y comunitarias en las que se encuentran, la Iglesia ayuda activamente a que las madres y sus hijos tengan un futuro mejor.

- Seguimos protegiendo la dignidad de nuestra hermana o hermano anciano, discapacitado o enfermo rechazando firmemente la eutanasia y el suicidio asistido. Estas prácticas son síntomas de una “cultura del descarte”, en la que los hijos de Dios de valor inestimable son desechados como inútiles.⁴
- Asimismo, debemos reconocer la dignidad inherente del migrante y refugiado. Ahora en nuestro país, eso significa una reforma migratoria integral que ofrezca un camino hacia la ciudadanía, trate a los trabajadores inmigrantes de manera justa, prevenga la separación de familias, mantenga la integridad de nuestras fronteras, respete el estado de derecho y aborde los factores que obligan a las personas a salir de sus propios países.
- Apoyamos la dignidad de la persona, creada hombre o mujer; por lo tanto, nos oponemos a una ideología de género que no reconoce la diferencia y la reciprocidad entre hombre y mujer.⁵
- El racismo ataca la dignidad de la persona humana al negar que todos estamos hechos igualmente a imagen de Dios, por lo que debemos superar el racismo tanto en nuestros corazones como en nuestros sistemas e instituciones.⁶
- Seguimos buscando la reforma del sistema de justicia penal y poner fin al uso de la pena de muerte. Apoyamos medidas de sentido común para reducir la violencia armada.⁷
- Finalmente, buscamos prevenir y remediar cualquier aspecto de una “economía de la

exclusión”⁸ que “no duda en explotar, descartar e incluso matar al hombre”⁹, y trabajamos en cambio hacia una “economía de la comunión” arraigada en una preocupación ética.¹⁰

“Hay un reconocimiento básico, esencial para caminar hacia la amistad social y la fraternidad universal”, escribe el Papa Francisco, “percibir cuánto vale un ser humano, cuánto vale una persona, siempre y en cualquier circunstancia”.¹¹ Que, a través de nuestra participación política, nuestro acompañamiento a los necesitados y el testimonio de nuestra vida diaria, podamos apoyar el valor de cada persona, creada a imagen de Dios.



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
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
