

My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today is World Mission Sunday. This year's theme, chosen by Pope Francis, is rooted in the Gospel of Matthew: "Go and Invite Everyone to the Banquet," reflecting the urgent call to bring God's love to everyone. Today we join Catholics around the globe in solidarity in supporting the mission of the Church in places where the faith is young, growing, or facing particular challenges.

Providentially, today is the Fifth Sunday of six in which I have included in this bulletin USCCB reflections on the formation of conscience for faithful citizenship, especially in light of our election in November. It is pertinent to World Mission Sunday and there we read that "Solidarity is "a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all." We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. The person is social in nature; we develop and flourish within a community. As baptized members of the community of the Church, we are part of one body in Christ and we are also part of one global human family." So many wonderful coincidences in October, or we might say "God-incidences," or simply, Providence. The Month of the Rosary, Respect Life Month, and today, World Mission Sunday. I encourage you to seek to live a life of human and Christian solidarity, in Christ's name, living for and in service of others,...all others, the born and the unborn, pondering Christ's words in today's Gospel, "...whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all. For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." May God give us this great gift and Grace!

Solidarity

In their statement on *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on **Solidarity**, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series. —★

Solidarity is “a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all.”¹ We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. The person is social in nature; we develop and flourish within a community. As baptized members of the community of the Church, we are part of one body in Christ and we are also part of one global human family.²

In *Fratelli Tutti* (*On Fraternity and Social Friendship*) Pope Francis places solidarity at the center of what it means to cultivate social friendship as one family:

*Solidarity means much more than engaging in sporadic acts of generosity. It means thinking and acting in terms of community. It means that the lives of all are prior to the appropriation of goods by a few. It also means combatting the structural causes of poverty, inequality, the lack of work, land, and housing, the denial of social and labor rights.*³

Thus, solidarity affects not only the goals we pursue in public life, but also the way we pursue them—ever mindful that we are all brothers and sisters, all children of God.

Solidarity requires that in our prayer and in our political engagement, those who are weak, vulnerable, and most in need receive preferential concern.

In imitation of the Good Samaritan, we seek to be neighbor to all.⁴ We are called to practice “radical solidarity” by accompanying pregnant women to choose life and by offering support to new mothers and their children.⁵ As neighbors to all, we also advocate for families affected by poverty, unemployment, or illness, individuals struggling with mental illness or addiction, the elderly and those with disabilities, and all whose livelihoods and homes are endangered by climate change.⁶

In countries ravaged by war, such as Ukraine, West Africa, and the Middle East, we must “touch the wounded flesh of the victims” and support efforts for relief and peace,⁷ while also working collaboratively to reduce and eliminate nuclear weapons.⁸

We seek policies that “welcome, protect, promote, and integrate” migrants and refugees who arrive at our borders, and which aid development in countries of origin.⁹

Racism is an obstacle to solidarity, and we strive to root it out not only by examining our hearts individually, but also by looking critically at our policies and institutions.¹⁰

In a culture that overemphasizes the accumulation of wealth, we must not forget our “obligation to ensure that every person lives with dignity and has sufficient opportunities for his or her integral development.”¹¹

As we seek to foster solidarity in hearts and policies, let us pray with Pope Francis in *Fratelli Tutti*:

*Lord, Father of our human family . . . Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war. Amen.*¹²

La solidaridad

En su declaración *Formando la conciencia para ser ciudadanos fieles*, los obispos católicos de los Estados Unidos identifican los cuatro principios fundamentales de la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia y los aplican a algunas cuestiones concretas. No se trata de decirles a los fieles por quién o contra quién votar, sino de ayudarlos a formar sus conciencias de acuerdo con la verdad de Dios a medida que se acercan a esta decisión a menudo desafiante. Los cuatro principios fundamentales son la Dignidad de la persona humana, el Bien común, la Solidaridad y la Subsidiariedad. Todos están interrelacionados. Este boletín se enfoca en la **Solidaridad**, y los otros tres principios se tratan en otros tres boletines de esta serie. ——★

La Solidaridad es “la determinación firme y perseverante de empeñarse por . . . el bien de todos y cada uno, para que todos seamos verdaderamente responsables de todos”.¹ Somos una familia humana, independientemente de nuestras diferencias nacionales, raciales, étnicas, económicas e ideológicas. La persona es de naturaleza social; nos desarrollamos y prosperamos dentro de una comunidad. Como miembros bautizados de la comunidad de la Iglesia, somos parte de un solo cuerpo en Cristo y también somos parte de una familia humana global.²

★ En *Fratelli Tutti (Sobre la fraternidad y la amistad social)*, el Papa Francisco sitúa la solidaridad en el centro de lo que significa cultivar la amistad social como una sola familia:

*[La solidaridad] es una palabra que expresa mucho más que algunos actos de generosidad esporádicos. Es pensar y actuar en términos de comunidad, de prioridad de la vida de todos sobre la apropiación de los bienes por parte de algunos. También es luchar contra las causas estructurales de la pobreza, la desigualdad, la falta de trabajo, de tierra, y de vivienda, la negación de los derechos sociales y laborales.*³

Por lo tanto, la solidaridad afecta no sólo los objetivos que perseguimos en la vida pública, sino también la forma en que los perseguimos, siempre conscientes de que todos somos hermanos y hermanas, todos hijos de Dios.

La solidaridad requiere que en nuestra oración y en nuestro compromiso político, aquellos que son débiles, vulnerables y más necesitados reciban una atención preferencial.

*A imitación del Buen Samaritano, buscamos ser prójimos de todos.*⁴

Estamos llamados a practicar la “solidaridad radical” acompañando a las mujeres embarazadas para elegir la vida y ofreciendo apoyo a las nuevas madres y a sus hijos.⁵ Como prójimos de todos, también abogamos por las familias afectadas por la pobreza, el desempleo o las enfermedades, las personas que luchan contra enfermedades mentales o adicciones, los ancianos y las personas con discapacidades, y todos aquellos cuyos recursos productivos y hogares están en peligro por el cambio climático.⁶

En países asolados por la guerra, como Ucrania, África occidental y Oriente Medio, debemos tocar “los cuerpos de los perjudicados” y apoyar los esfuerzos de ayuda y paz,⁷ y al mismo tiempo trabajar en colaboración para reducir y eliminar las armas nucleares.⁸

Buscamos políticas que ayudan a “acoger, proteger, promover e integrar” a los migrantes y refugiados que llegan a nuestras fronteras y que ayuden al desarrollo en los países de origen.⁹

El racismo es un obstáculo para la solidaridad y nos esforzamos por erradicarlo no sólo examinando nuestros corazones individualmente, sino también examinando críticamente nuestras políticas e instituciones.¹⁰

En una cultura que pone demasiado énfasis en la acumulación de riqueza, no debemos olvidar que “como comunidad estamos cominados a garantizar que cada persona viva con dignidad y tenga oportunidades adecuadas a su desarrollo integral”.¹¹

Mientras buscamos fomentar la solidaridad en los corazones y las políticas, oremos con el Papa Francisco en *Fratelli Tutti*:

Señor y Padre de la humanidad. . . Impúlsanos a crear sociedades más sanas y un mundo más digno, sin hambre, sin pobreza, sin violencia, sin guerras”. Amén.¹²



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
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
