Reflection by Fr. Jeremy Paulin, OMV

Yesterday, February 8, we celebrated one of my favorite saints, St Josephine Bakhita. I love her. Her life and God's work in her is remarkable, and gives me great hope.

Pope Benedict wrote about her in his Encyclical Spe Salvi, on Christian Hope. "She was born around 1869—she herself did not know the precise date—in Darfur in Sudan. At the age of nine, she was kidnapped by slave-traders, beaten till she bled, and sold five times in the slave-markets of Sudan. Eventually she found herself working as a slave for the mother and the wife of a general, and there she was flogged every day till she bled; as a result of this she bore 144 scars throughout her life. Finally, in 1882, she was bought by an Italian merchant for the Italian consul Callisto Legnani, who returned to Italy as the Mahdists advanced. Here, after the terrifying "masters" who had owned her up to that point, Bakhita came to know a totally different kind of "master"-in Venetian dialect, which she was now learning, she used the name "paron" for the living God, the God of Jesus Christ. Up to that time she had known only masters who despised and maltreated her, or at best considered her a useful slave. Now, however, she heard that there is a "paron" above all masters, the Lord of all lords, and that this Lord is good, goodness in person. She came to know that this Lord even knew her, that he had created her—that he actually loved her. She too was loved, and by none other than the supreme "Paron", before whom all other masters are themselves no more than lowly servants. She was known and loved and she was awaited. What is more, this master had himself accepted the destiny of being flogged and now he was waiting for her "at the Father's right hand". Now she had "hope" —no longer simply the modest hope of finding masters who would be less cruel, but the great hope: "I am definitively loved and whatever happens to me-I am awaited by this Love. And so my life is good.""

St Josephine was baptized at 21 and would frequently return to kiss the baptismal font from which she had received eternal life. She could never stop speaking of the goodness of God who loved and awaited her. Look up St. Josephine. Learn more about her. Pray to her. You are awaited.

Ayer 8 de febrero celebramos a una de mis santas favoritas, Santa Josefina Bakhita. La amo. Su vida y la obra de Dios en ella es notable y me da una gran esperanza.

El Papa Benedicto escribió sobre ella en su encíclica Spe Salvi, sobre la esperanza cristiana. "Nació alrededor de 1869 (ella misma no sabía la fecha exacta) en Darfur, Sudán. A la edad de nueve años, fue secuestrada por traficantes de esclavos, golpeada hasta sangrar y vendida cinco veces en los mercados de esclavos de Sudán Finalmente se encontró trabajando como esclava para la madre y esposa de un general, y allí fue azotada todos los días hasta sangrar, a consecuencia de esto tuvo 144 cicatrices a lo largo de su vida. Finalmente, en 1882, fue comprada por un comerciante italiano para el cónsul italiano Callisto Legnani, quien regresó a Italia ante el avance de los mahdistas. Aquí, tras los terroríficos "amos" que la habían poseído hasta entonces, Bakhita conoció una. Un tipo de "maestro" totalmente diferente: en el dialecto veneciano, que ahora estaba aprendiendo, usaba el nombre de "paron" para designar al Dios vivo, el Dios de Jesucristo. Hasta ese momento sólo había conocido maestros que despreciaban y despreciaban. La maltrataba o, en el mejor de los casos, la consideraba una esclava útil. Ahora, sin embargo, escuchó que hay un "parón" sobre todos los amos, el Señor de todos los señores, y que este Señor es el bien, la bondad en persona. Llegó a saber que este Señor incluso la conocía, que él la había creado, que realmente la amaba. Ella también fue amada, y nada menos que por el supremo "Paron", ante quien todos los demás amos no son más que humildes sirvientes. Era conocida, amada y esperada. Es más, este maestro había aceptado el destino de ser azotado y ahora la esperaba "a la diestra del Padre". Ahora tenía "esperanza", ya no simplemente la modesta esperanza de encontrar amos menos crueles, sino la gran esperanza: "Soy definitivamente amada y, pase lo que pase, soy esperada por este Amor. Y por eso mi vida es buena".

Santa Josefina fue bautizada a los 21 años y frecuentemente regresaba para besar la pila bautismal de la que había recibido la vida eterna. Nunca podía dejar de hablar de la bondad de Dios que la amaba y esperaba. Busque Santa Josefina. Aprenda más sobre ella. Rezale a ella. Estás esperando.

February is the Month dedicated to the Holy Family

Pope Francis on the Holy Family

The Gospel tells of when Jesus, at the age of twelve, at the end of the annual pilgrimage to Jerusalem, went missing from Mary and Joseph, who found Him afterwards in the Temple conversing with the teachers (cf. *Lk* 2:41-52). The Evangelist Luke reveals the state of mind of Mary who asks Jesus, "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety" (v. 48). And Jesus replies, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" (v. 49).

It is an almost commonplace experience of a family that alternates between calm moments and dramatic ones. It appears to be the story of a family crisis, a crisis of our times, of a difficult teenager and two parents who are unable to understand him. Let us pause to look at this family. Do you know why the Family of Nazareth is a model? Because it is a family that converses, that listens, that talks. Dialogue is an important element for a family! A family that does not communicate cannot be a happy family.

It is good when a mother does not start with a rebuke, but with a question. Mary does not accuse and does not judge, but tries to understand how to accept this Son who is so different by listening. Despire this effort, the Gospel says that Mary and Joseph "did not understand what He said to them" (v. 50), showing that in the family it is more important to listen than to understand. Listening is giving importance to the other, recognizing his or her right to exist and think autonomously. Children need this. Think carefully, parents: listen to your children, who need this!

Mealtimes are a special moment for dialogue in the family. It is good to stay together around the table and to speak. This can solve many problems, and above all unite the generations: children who speak with their parents, grandchildren who speak with their grandparents... Never remain closed in on yourself or, even worse, with your head turned to your mobile phone. This will not do, never, never this. Talk, listen to each other, this is the dialogue that is good for you and that makes you grow!

The Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph is *holy*. And yet we have seen that even Jesus' parents did not always understand Him. We can reflect on this, and let us not be sur-

Holy Family of Nazareth, make us once more mindful of the sacredness and inviolability of the family, and its beauty in God's plan. Amen.

prised if at times it happens that we do not understand each other. When it happens, let us ask ourselves: have we listened to each other? Do we confront problems by listening to each other or do we close up in silence, at times in resentment and pride? Do we take a little time to converse? What we can learn from the Holy Family today is mutual listening.

Let us entrust ourselves to the Virgin Mary and ask for our families the gift of listening.

Febrero es el mes dedicado a la Sagrada Familia

Papa Francisco sobre la Sagrada Familia

El Evangelio cuenta cuando Jesús, a la edad de doce años, al final de la peregrinación anual a Jerusalén, desapareció de María y José, quienes lo encontraron después en el templo conversando con los maestros (cf. Lc 2, 41-52).). El evangelista Lucas revela el estado de ánimo de María que pregunta a Jesús: "Hijo, ¿por qué nos has hecho esto? Tu padre y yo te buscábamos con gran ansiedad" (v. 48). Y Jesús responde: "¿Por qué me buscabais? ¿No sabíais que me es necesario estar en la casa de mi Padre?" (v. 49).

Es una experiencia casi común de una familia que alterna momentos de calma y momentos dramáticos. Parece ser la historia de una crisis familiar, una crisis de nuestro tiempo, de un adolescente difícil y de dos padres que no logran comprenderlo. Hagamos una pausa para mirar a esta familia. ¿Sabes por qué la Familia de Nazaret es modelo? Porque es una familia que conversa, que escucha, que habla. ¡El diálogo es un elemento importante para una familia! Una familia que no se comunica no puede ser una familia feliz.

Es bueno que una madre no empiece con una reprimenda, sino con una pregunta. María no acusa ni juzga, sino que intenta comprender cómo acoger a este Hijo tan diferente escuchando. Pese a este esfuerzo, el Evangelio dice que María y José "no entendieron lo que les decía" (v. 50), mostrando que en la familia es más importante escuchar que comprender. Escuchar es dar importancia al otro, reconocer su derecho a existir y pensar de forma autónoma. Los niños necesitan esto. Piensen bien, padres: ¡escuchen a sus hijos, que lo necesitan!

La hora de comer es un momento especial para el diálogo en familia. Es bueno permanecer juntos alrededor de la mesa y hablar. Esto puede solucionar muchos problemas y, sobre todo, unir a las generaciones: hijos que hablan con sus padres, nietos que hablan con sus abuelos... Nunca permanezcas encerrado en ti mismo o, peor aún, con la cabeza vuelta hacia el teléfono móvil. Esto no servirá, nunca, nunca esto. Hablad, escuchaos, ¡este es el diálogo que os hace bien y que os hace crecer!

La Familia de Jesús, María y José es santa. Y, sin embargo, hemos visto que ni siquiera los padres de Jesús siempre lo

Cuando esto suceda, preguntémonos: ¿nos hemos escuchado unos a otros? ¿Afrontamos los problemas escuchándonos unos a otros o nos encerramos en silencio, a veces con resentimiento y orgullo? ¿Nos tomamos un poco de tiempo para conversar? Lo que podemos aprender hoy de la Sagrada Familia es la escucha mutua.


